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OET and IELTS

OET

OET is a test of Healthcare English recognised by healthcare regulators, including the NMC, GMC and GPhC.

There are 12 versions of the test, covering 12 different healthcare professions. The most commonly taken version is OET Nursing, followed by OET Medicine.

Candidates take 4 papers in one day, Listening, Reading and Writing in the morning and Speaking in the afternoon. Listening and Reading are the same for all professions. Writing and Speaking are profession-specific.

In the test, candidates listen to clinical consultations, workplace conversations and academic talks. They read articles, data, and extracts from workplace documents. They write a letter in response to case notes. They role play being a nurse in conversation with a patient, relative, or carer.

IELTS

Academic IELTS is accepted by professional regulators, including the NMC, GMC and HCPC. However, it is a test of academic English used primarily by universities to assess the English of overseas applicants. There is a General Training version of IELTS used by the UK Border Authority among others.

Like OET, candidates sit all papers in one day, taking Listening, Reading and Writing in the morning and Speaking in the afternoon.

In the test, candidates listen to conversations and talks set in everyday and academic contexts, read texts taken from books and journals, write a report on data and an academic essay, and present on and discuss a range of topics.

OET or IELTS?

In our experience, healthcare professionals prefer studying for OET. The language and scenarios are more familiar, and they have many opportunities to see, hear and use the target language in a professional context outside the classroom. Results are typically stronger with significantly higher first-time pass rates.

OET preparation courses also support candidates in passing clinical communication tests such as the Nursing OSCE and PLAB.

For some candidates, IELTS is preferable. There are many more test centres worldwide, a very wide range of preparation resources such as course books, practice tests and dedicated websites, and is cheaper to take.

What language level do candidates need to achieve?

As of 2023, the required scores for nurses and doctors are as follows:

Exam	Listening	Reading	Writing	Speaking
OET Nursing	B	B	C+	B
OET Medicine	B	B	B	B
IELTS (if a nurse)	7	7	6.5	7
IELTS (if a doctor)	7	7	7	7

Note: nurses can combine results from 2 tests taken over 12 months, as long as the score achieved in the papers not passed is only half a grade lower than required.

The language level is high. An OET B and IELTS 7 are equivalent to a C1 on the CEFR (Common European Framework of Reference), the scale used worldwide to measure linguistic competence. See Appendix (link to page) for more detail.

C1 is an advanced level, the band below that of native speaker. It is the equivalent to what a 2nd year undergraduate studying Modern Languages at a UK university would be expected to demonstrate¹.

Where do most candidates start at?

In our experience, most candidates start with an intermediate level of English. This is a very wide band on the CEFR scale, consisting of B1 (lower-intermediate) and B2 (higher intermediate) levels – again, see Appendix for details.

How long do candidates need to get to C1 level?

To move from one band to another takes most motivated adults approximately 200 hours, depending on factors like teaching pedagogy, access to resources, and knowledge of other languages. So, to go from B1 to C1 involves around 400 hours, and from B2, 200 hours².

The hours of study include both tutoring and guided self-study. We recommend an equal number of both.

Exam techniques and strategies

200 hours per level is required for language improvement alone. Candidates also require extensive coaching on the techniques and strategies needed for their test.

The test day can be an intensive and stressful experience. It is essential for candidates to know what to expect, what the examiners are looking for, how to manage the unpredictable, and how to maximise the time available.

Language development and test preparation are central to all SLC's OET and IELTS preparation courses.



How can NHS employers support their candidates?

Working in partnership with Trusts to support candidates maximises the chances of candidates achieving the OET and IELTS scores they need.

As an NHS employer, you can take a number of measures to support your candidates.

- 1.** Help set expectations, including on attendance and homework commitments. The courses are hard work so candidates need to be ready to commit to doing the study.
- 2.** Make it easy for candidates to attend lessons, for example by providing paid study and ensuring they don't work night shifts before lessons.
- 3.** Make sure candidates can get online and have access to a quiet space for lessons, either at work or from home.
- 4.** Give candidates a point of contact at the Trust who they can discuss the course with, for example if they cannot attend or if they're struggling with the work set.
- 5.** Ensure SLC has a consistent point of contact, ideally the same as above, to support scheduling, review progress together, deal with any issues, and to book tests.
- 6.** See what can be done at the Trust to support the course. Some Trusts help arrange on-site mock tests, others set up reading groups, or provide practice for the role plays in OET Speaking.
- 7.** Provide lots of ongoing encouragement!

Appendix

Language levels as defined by the CEFR

The CEFR or Common European Framework of Reference is the scale developed by the Council of Europe and used by the global language education sector to measure linguistic competence.

There are six levels of proficiency moving from complete beginner to native speaker. Each level is defined by 'can-do' descriptors which apply as a learner completes the level. The test scores required by the NMC and GMC are C1.

PROFICIENT USER	C2	Can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read. Can summarise information from different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation. Can express him/herself spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations.
	C1	Can understand a wide range of demanding, longer texts, and recognise implicit meaning. Can express him/herself fluently and spontaneously without much obvious searching for expressions. Can use language flexibly and effectively for social, academic and professional purposes. Can produce clear, well-structured, detailed text on complex subjects, showing controlled use of organisational patterns, connectors and cohesive devices.
INDEPENDENT USER	B2	Can understand the main ideas of complex text on both concrete and abstract topics, including technical discussions in his/her field of specialisation. Can interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity that makes regular interaction with native speakers quite possible without strain for either party. Can produce clear, detailed text on a wide range of subjects and explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.
	B1	Can understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc. Can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken. Can produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest. Can describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes & ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.
BASIC USER	A2	Can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment). Can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters. Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.
	A1	Can understand and use familiar everyday expressions and very basic phrases aimed at the satisfaction of needs of a concrete type. Can introduce him/herself and others and can ask and answer questions about personal details such as where he/she lives, people he/she knows and things he/she has. Can interact in a simple way provided the other person talks slowly and clearly and is prepared to help.
